- **<u>1:30PM: MESSAR Group Event: Visit to Portland Landmark Observatory</u>.** Since 1807, the Portland Observatory has offered spectacular views of Portland's busy harbor and served as a beloved symbol of the city's rich maritime heritage. Named a National Historic Landmark in 2006, the Portland Observatory is the only known remaining historic wooden maritime signal tower in the United States. Especially opened this date for MESSAR it is said you can see Mt Washington on a clear day.

Presentation by Clark Whelton "George Washington and the Hand of Providence: Ten Miracles that Saved America."

The presentation, with slides:

Between the spring of 1775 and December, 1776, our young nation went from victory and hope to defeat and despair. George Washington and the American army, victorious in Boston, suffered humiliating defeats in New York, and retreated to Pennsylvania. For all intents and purposes, the Revolutionary War was over. The British had won. General Cornwallis had booked passage on the next ship to England. Things were so bad for our patriot ancestors that Richard Stockton, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, renounced his allegiance to the cause of American independence.

But in the midst of catastrophe, one extraordinary event after another kept the light of freedom aglow. So striking was this pattern of seemingly miraculous happenings, that Washington himself called it "The Hand of Providence" intervening on the American side. He wrote that anyone doubting that divine intervention was involved "must be worse than an infidel."

About the Presentor, Clark Whelton:

Clark is a <u>member</u> of our own <u>Maine State SAR</u>. He is a graduate of <u>Bates College</u>, and lives in New York with his wife Diane, who also went to Bates, and who was chaplain of her DAR chapter in the Hudson Valley. For many years Clark and Diane had a camp on <u>Highland Lake in Bridgton</u> and consider Maine their second home. Clark's ancestors, including his patriot ancestor James Randall of Limington, were <u>Maine Quakers</u>, primarily from the Clough and Jones families, who settled in <u>Windham</u>, <u>Durham and on China</u> Lake in the 18th century. Clark began his writing career as a journalist with the Village Voice in New York City, and later served as <u>chief speechwriter for New York City mayors Ed Koch and Rudy Giuliani</u>. He has a special interest in American history.
